- 2. This is a preface to the rest of the Psalms or even a door to the rest
- 3. The thoughts of Psalm 1 are restated in the other 149 Psalms
- 4. There are three contrast in this Psalm
 - a. Contrast verse 1 and 2 the happy man
 - b. Contrast verse 3 and 4 the ungodly man
 - c. Contrast verse 5 and 6 the destination of both men
- 5. Let us study this Psalm with the view of making application to ourselves.

II Discussion

- 1. The happy man
 - a. This is what we want and are to be and when we see that we are doing these things to be happy we are to be encouraged
 - b. The happy man stated negatively
 - i. This is the successive steps in the pursuit of evil
 - ii. We must avoid evil advice, associates, and attitudes.
 - iii. This passage also contains evildoers in every form and degree, wicked, sinners and scornful and could be the same person
 - iv. Walk by for a glance at evil to satisfy curiosity
 - 1. Walk is used many times to denote a way of life
 - 2. The Christian life begins with a step and it grows by taking further steps
 - 3. Walking is progressive
 - v. Counsel is advice, plan or patter of life
 - 1. Eve followed evil advise Genesis 3
 - 2. Ahaziah followed the advice of his mother who was the sister of Ahab 2 Chronicles 22:3-5
 - 3. Christ ought to be our Counselor Isaiah 9:6
 - vi. Standeth
 - 1. Movement has now stopped, evil has gotten its grips around this individual
 - 2. The righteous will not stop with these professional sinners 1 Corinthians 15:33
 - vii. Sitteth
 - 1. Greater comfort, the sinner is relaxed and restful in sin
 - 2. Evil is not a confirmed way of life
 - 3. We should try to keep a great distance between the sacred and the profane
 - c. The happy man stated positively
 - i. The happy man is saturated with the Word Verse 2
 - ii. This man is blessed because of what he does; trying to please God
 - iii. This man seeks righteousness as a wild animal pants after fresh water of the brook Psalm 42:1
 - iv. The Word captures and claims his full attention
 - 1. He is learning the truth; his study is not burdensome
 - 2. He is living the truth; He is not just reading but applying to himself

- 3. He is teaching the truth
- v. He is meditating chewing on it and applying it
- vi. It is day and night, all his thoughts and actions are governed by his desire to be obedient to God's Word
- vii. He brings for fruit Galatians 5:22-23; Romans 7:4
- 2. The ungodly man
 - a. We do not want to be like this man if we see ourselves doing these things changes ought to be made in our lives so that we can be the happy man
 - b. Horticultural is the theme of this contrast
 - c. The blessed man is like a tree with water
 - i. This is the power of choice, he chose to be in this place Proverbs 3:6
 - ii. The roots go down deep Colossians 1:23; 2:7
 - iii. The blessings of a tree, and the good that it does it is "green"
 - d. The ungodly man is like the chaff of wheat Matthew 3:12
- 3. The destinations of either man
 - a. The destination of each man is listed
 - b. Both will be at the judgment. The ungodly will not endure the judgment
 - c. In contrast with what the world states there are but two way, one to heaven the other to hell Matthew 7:13-14; 21-23; 25:32
 - d. We will be judged by what we have done 2 Corinthians 5:10
