Introduction

- 1. 1 Corinthians 1:1, 2 (2 X), 9, 24, 26 total of 6 X in this first chapter
- 2. There are many calls in the Bible and some are different calls
- 3. We have the same today, we can have friendly calls, business calls, wrong calls, and missed calls; there are some calls that we want to miss and some we do not want to miss!
- 4. When Christ comes again it will be with a call of the trumpet 1 Corinthians 15:52; 1 Thessalonians 4:16
- 5. The calls of the Bible are very interesting, let us study these in 1 Corinthians 1

II Discussion

- 1. Paul was called to be an apostle 1:1
 - a. The word "called" to call anyone, to invite, or summon
 - b. Paul was called by Jesus Christ in Acts 9, 22, 26
 - c. He asked what shall I do Acts 22:10
 - d. Ananias told him why he was called Acts 22:14
 - e. Christ told him why he was called Acts 26:16-18
 - f. He was not disobedient to that calling Acts 22:19
 - g. He was told to be baptized to have his sins washed away 22:16
 - i. If he was saved before this Ananias did not know it, Saul did not know it and the Lord did not know it
 - h. He was qualified to be a witness Acts 22:15; Acts 1:22
 - i. Our calling is different 2Thessalonians 2:14 (different word)
- 2. The Corinthians were called to be saints 1:2
 - a. Same word as above, thus they were invited or summoned but how
 - h Acts 18.1_11
 - i. Paul reasoned and he could testify that Jesus was the Christ Verses 4-5
 - ii. Many of the Corinthians hearing believed and were baptized verse 8
 - iii. The Lord had much people in that city
 - c. This is as Paul says in 2 Thessalonians 2:14 (different word with the background of command)
 - d. This is why we are to preach to everyone Matthew 28:18-20; Mark 16:15-16; 2 Timothy 2:2
 - e. Jesus has issued an invitation to all Matthew 11:28-30
 - f. To be called a saint we must do the same thing that they did. 1 Corinthians 6:11
- 3. Those that call upon the name of the Lord 1:2
 - a. This word is different that the above words and it means to invoke or entitle for aid; to be dedicated to a person; making use of His name
 - b. This was stated in Joel 2:32; Acts 2:21; Romans 10:13
 - c. This is done by obey the Lord's commands Acts 22:16 (same word)
 - d. Thus we need aid in having our sins removed
 - e. WE are to be dedicated to the Lord
 - f. When we are baptized we are using His name
- 4. The Corinthians were called unto the fellowship of Jesus Christ our Lord 1:9
 - a. This is the same word as found in 2 Thessalonians 2:14; it is a calling with the background of a command
 - b. This word is a verb second person plural agrist passive indicative
 - i. It is a orist an action has taken place prior to the writing (they had already been baptized with put them into Christ Galatians 3:26-27)

- ii. It is passive it received the action (They were in the fellowship with Christ then 1 John 1:3, 7; Acts 2:42; 2 Corinthians 6:14)
- iii. It is indicative the action is certain or realized
- c. We have been called into the fellowship with Christ our Lord
 - i. Is He our Lord
 - ii. Do we have fellowship with Him?
- 5. The Power of the Gospel is seen in this calling 1:24
 - a. The changing power of Christ is seen in the calling.
 - b. The Jews had to change as well as the Gentiles, but the Corinthians had to change; it was done by the Crucified Christ Acts 18:4, 11; 1 Corinthians 6:9-11
- 6. Consider your calling 1:26
 - a. Look at your invitation and see who was called the wise, powerful and rich though they have the invitation, have not responded to it in a positive way
 - b. The invitation is to all 1 Timothy 2:4; Hebrews 2:9; Matthew 11:28-30
 - c. Yet many are too busy to respond Luke 14:15-24; Matthew 7:21-23
 - d. The calling is still what God wants us to respond to 1:18

- 2. You will not be called in the same way Paul was but the Lord is still calling today
- 3. What will you do with the invitation?
- 4. Why not accept the invitation and be saved, to reject the invitation or neglect the invitation is to be lost. The choice is your
