- 3. He was told to quit, but he told them different because he was not chosen by them to preach, but by God Amos 6:13-17
- 4. Amos uses many interesting illustrations to show their condition as they stood before God. Grasshoppers, famine, Cows, plumbline
- 5. In our lesson today Amos pronounces two woes upon them, let us notice these quickly

## **II Discussion**

- 1. The first Woe 5:18-27
  - a. Attitudes and worship
    - i. Expectation 18-20
      - 1. The desire for the day of the Lord to come
      - 2. It would not be as they expected. It was
        - a. Darkness not light
        - b. Flee a lion and met a bear
        - c. Placed hand on wall and there is a serpent
    - ii. Their worship
      - God hated their gatherings, feast days Passover, Harvest, Tabernacles 21a
      - 2. Unacceptable offerings, 22
        - a. The offerings were items that would or is supposed to consecrate the worshiper
      - 3. Their songs Instrumental music was not acceptable to God, 23 Adam Clarke on Amos 6:5
      - 4. Their worship was devoid of application, ritual
        - a. Martin Luther King Jr. quoted verse 24 often
      - 5. The worship for the 40 years of wandering was not correct, it was mingled with idol worship of Moloch and Chiun
    - iii. Therefore you will go into captivity, 722BC
- 2. The second Woe is one showing their indifference
  - a. Description of indifference Those that are at ease in Zion 6:1, Jerusalem
    - i. Military security
  - b. The challenge to indifference verse 2
    - i. Check these cities and see what happened to them
    - ii. The leaders were happy with the status quo

- iii. The leaders were more interested in their privileges
- c. The Sin of indifference 3-6 shown with 6 word pictures
  - i. Guilty of hardened unbelief verse 3 put away...
    - 1. The refused the voice of warning
    - 2. They did not deny the day of Judgement was coming, it was not for them
  - ii. Heartless oppression 6:3b seat of violence... violence was encouraged
  - iii. Self-indulgence ivory couches, finest food
  - iv. They indulged in profane revelry they chant sounded like drunken feast
    - 1. The musical instruments were used to worship idol their belly
  - v. Drunken debauchery verse 6
    - 1. Large sacrificial bowls used in the temples, sacrilege
    - 2. Consuming large amounts of wine
    - 3. Anointing themselves, while could be good, but here again hints at sacrilege
  - vi. Calloused unconcern verse 6b they did not grieve when they should
    - 1. They were too concerned with self-indulgence that they could not see the approaching doom
    - 2. The leaders put their own welfare above the people of the nation
- d. The punishment of indifference 6:7
  - i. They would go away into captivity 722 BC
